



A Word from Pastor Pam


As we enter the season of Lent, we have many opportunities in which to engage as both a Christ community and as individuals. Over the past three weeks, we have invited ministry partners to be present with us and share how important our relationships are to one another as we work to proclaim the gospel message. I hope that you have heard the kind of difference that Lord of Life is making both with the church domestically and globally. During Bishop Hutterer's visit, she connected the gospel message of how we learn from Jesus to make a difference in the lives of those across the globe from us by our support for the Grand Canyon Synod's work with the people of Senegal in West Africa. The support of the ELCA makes it possible for the gospel news to coexist in a country which is predominantly practicing the Muslim faith.

Following the Bishop's visit, we hosted representatives from our West Coast Seminary, Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary (PLTS) and a student directly impacted by Lord of Life's generosity. We heard stories about the importance of financial and spiritual accompaniment for those entering the work of ministry. We also learned about how seminary is making adaptive changes to remain accessible and relevant in the future. In a world and time where technology is making our global reach larger and where church has become less central in community life, we know that both the presence of the church and theological education must adapt to remain viable. I hope that Lord of Life will play an instrumental part in an upcoming pilot program that PLTS is launching toward these goals. More information to follow, stay tuned.

We learned about the important role of Lutheran's in the public sphere as we hosted Solveig Muus, the director of Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Arizona. Were you already aware that Solveig is a member of Grace Lutheran Church in downtown Phoenix? Lord of Life has been a partner in that ministry for decades and we continue to provide clothing and other donations to that ministry which makes such critical differences in the lives of people who must find ways to survive living without permanent shelter and basic needs. We learned that advocacy for compassionate and merciful legislation is part of our Lutheran DNA and explicitly part of what Martin Luther stated as our Christian responsibility.

These examples and more are the gospel translated into living reality. Making the love of Jesus accessible for all means so much more than filling a sanctuary on a Sunday morning. Loving Jesus means loving Jesus' people and Jesus' people are everywhere. Jesus always calls us to look outside of and beyond our places of comfort. As we engage in the study of John during this Lenten season, we will hear again the seven "I Am" statements of Jesus. These statements are the ligaments and tendons of our life together with Jesus and creation. We will explore our local Lenten "40-40-40" challenge to help bring safe, potable water to those who do not have it right here in our own state.

Beloved people of Lord of Life Lutheran Church, God's work is calling us to love and serve out neighbor. Let's live out the gospel for others in this Lenten season.

We mentioned at our last congregational meeting that our gifts hadn't met our budget plan. In response we had to make a number of reductions in our budget for 2025. One of those reductions was a small reduction to our Benevolence plan. A week after the meeting I was approached by one of our members who was very dismayed about any reductions in our giving to others. She was adamant that benevolence should be our highest priority. She went on to tell me that she was committed to give as much as she could even though her only income was from Social Security. In addition to their regular giving as she sponsored a child with Feed My Starving Children as well as a number of other specialized opportunities. The next weekend I saw her at church and she told me that she had no family and Lord of Life was her family. She also mentioned that the Lord had spoken to her and told her to "do your part." She listened and has made an additional check to benevolence. The same weekend, I was at the Farmers Market and was talking to the "Bread Man." He had given a substantial gift to Feed My Starving Children last year and I asked if he was interested in making a donation this year. He said yes and he was going to more than double what he gave last year. He went on to tell me his life story. He was born in Korea to an American GI and a Korean mother. The GI went home and he was left to fend for himself. He was not accepted by the people because of his mixed race. At the age of six, he was begging for food and digging through garbage cans. Luckily he was adopted by a family from the USA and he was able to become a baker and achive success. He gives whenever he can because he knows what hunger is.

God has spoken to me through these persons and their examples.



The courtyard will be the next area to work on. The staining of the medallion is still on hold. Shades and courtyard furniture and cushions are still awaiting completion. The Building and Grounds Committee will undertake some of these tasks and others may have to wait until funds from the maintenance reserve fund are allocated. As for the West Valley Mission Project, a committee of members continues to meet to discuss the selected area for a mission start. They also are seeking ways to find a mission developer, and to seek available grants from the Synod. More information will be provided in the next Lifelines.



#### Echo Mesa Friendship Group

Echo Mesa Friendship Group hosted by Martha Bleyl, Diane Jordan and Gary Tharalson visited Valley View Community Food Bank in Sun City. It was founded in March 2007, by

Jesse Ramirez. He is so committed to helping those that are less fortunate. He told us wonderful stories of people who help, who donate. The Food Bank receives donations of food and monies, from individuals, community, churches and businesses. They receive no help from the government. We were shocked to hear that they pay \$10,000. (yes, ten thousand) per month rent for the spot they are presently using.

They plan to move into the building across the way that they have purchased. Their monthly loan payment will be less than the rent they are presently paying. They give out 2,000 boxes of food per day, five days a week. Some of their distribution areas: Foundation Office in Sun City West, Luke Air Force Base, Food City by El Mirage, and the Food Bank at Sun City . It's no wonder that their shelves were looking bare. Next time you go grocery shopping, pick up several items to put in our shopping cart located in the Narthex; it goes to the food bank. If you want to support a good cause by volunteering or donating, this is it.


